PROGRAM NOTES

Boris Anisimov (1907-1997) Poem (1961)

Duration: 7 minutes

Boris Anisimov was a Russian composer, conductor, and trombonist during the 20th century; however, there is little known about him and the piece. *Poem* is a short work for solo horn and piano. Through beautiful lyrical lines, big romantic fanfares, and rubato, *Poem* shows all that the horn is capable of. The piece opens with an epic motive that returns throughout the piece. It transitions into a smooth lyrical section to bring stylistic contrast into the piece. Finally, there is a short cadenza followed by a fast chromatic scale that concludes the piece.

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750); arr. Wendall Hoss

Cello Suite No. 2 in D Minor, BWV 1008 (Ca. 1720)

Duration: 8 minutes

Johann Sebastian Bach was a German composer and musician during the late Baroque period. Of his many works, the Cello Suites are some of his most well-known and are a staple in the cello repertoire. All of Bach's Cello Suites were transcribed and arranged for solo horn by Wendell Hoss. Suite No. 2 is written in D minor and expresses a solemn, melancholy feel. The *Prelude* consists of running sixteenth notes with recurring pauses on the second beat. The harmonic sequences built throughout the movement make for an exciting finish to the *Prelude*. The *Gigue* is the sixth movement of the suite. It represents English or Irish jigs and is a more upbeat movement with big leaps and repetitive rhythmic figures.

Franz Strauss (1822-1905) Horn Concerto. Op. 8 (1865)

Duration: 14 minutes

Franz Joseph Strauss was a German composer who played many instruments, including the horn. He was born in Bavaria and held the principal horn position in the Bavarian Court Orchestra for years. He is known for his horn compositions including his concerto and numerous smaller works for solo horn. He premiered his concerto in 1865 when he performed as the soloist. Richard Strauss is more widely known for his two horn concerti, but he was profoundly influenced by his father, Franz.

This piece is a continuous work with three distinct movements. It consists of beautiful singing melodies that demonstrate the rich tone of the instrument, a distinct characteristic of his writing. The first and third movements end with a fast series of sixteenth notes to show the technical abilities of the horn and create an epic ending to the piece. Gunther Schuller (1925-2015) Duets for Unaccompanied Horns (1962)

Duration: 6 minutes

Gunther Schuller was a man of many talents. He was an American composer, conductor, horn player, jazz musician, and educator. His piece, *Duets for Unaccompanied Horn*, is a funny, playful piece. He uses timbre, pitch, and rhythm to create comical melodies that are fun to listen to. The two horns play off of each other and create incredible effects with the unique harmonies and rhythms he writes.
